The National Great Blacks In Wax Museum will kick off its year-long programming with events and traveling exhibits centered around the theme, *Civil Wrongs To Civil Rights And Back Again—The Struggle Continues*.

The Thirteenth Amendment Tour

Join Renaissance Productions and Tours, Frederick Douglass-Isaac Myers Maritime Park and Museum, and The National Great Blacks In Wax Museum for The Thirteenth Amendment Tour, a 4 hour learning experience on Monday, February 13, 2017. *Listen and Learn as we answer the question, "Has slavery ever ended in America*, and explore the past and present day ramifications of the 13th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution.

About the 13th Amendment Tour

- starts at 10:00 a.m. at The National Great Blacks In Wax Museum, here participants go on a one hour guided tour to learn why this amendment was necessary to fix the shortcomings of Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation and how these shortcomings relate today to the criminalization of African Americans, the need for criminal justice reform, and the rise of movements such as Black Lives Matter.
- proceeds by motorcoach to the Douglass-Myers Maritime Park. Along with a guided tour of the cultural facility, patrons meet Frederick Douglass played by character actor Artartus Jenkins and witness firsthand Douglass' role in the passage of the Thirteenth Amendment.
- culminates with the screening of 13th, the thought-provoking documentary which analyzes the criminalization of African Americans and the U.S. prison boom. Director Ava DuVernay, is credited with a Golden Globe nomination.
- includes lunch consisting of movie fare (hot dog, popcorn, beverage)
