### Message From Dr. Joanne Martin

Dear Colleagues, Friends, and Supporters,

It seems like only yesterday that Dr. Elmer Martin and I opened our storefront Museum on Saratoga Street in downtown Baltimore. However, yesterday was 1983.

A milestone moment like this sent me on a stroll down memory lane, where I discovered memories, many unshared, some almost lost to time. A number of you know the "ring story", but how many of you know that Dr. Elmer Martin was stopped by the Beltway police for having Frederick Douglass's legs hanging out of the window of my Pontiac. Or that hearing a noise from a mechanical device Elmer and a friend had rigged up, a frightened lady ran out of the Saratoga Street Museum, leaving her baby behind in a stroller.

I remembered the twenty five or more real- life figures in wax form that I actually met, including Dr. Dorothy Height, Colin Powell, Shirley Chisholm, Benjamin Hooks, Julian Bond, FUBU, Parren Mitchell, and the legendary Rosa Parks.

Imagine the Museum being a regular feature of Charles Dutton's situation comedy "Rock". Set in Baltimore, the show displayed the characters wearing Museum hats, tees, buttons, and holding our souvenir mugs, not to mention one of our posters with Malcolm X.

What a thrill it was to learn that Lupita Nyong'o, from 12 Years A Slave, stated in an interview that she followed the advice of a fellow actor to "get down to that little wax museum in Baltimore", as the way to prepare for her academy award winning role. "So many stories, so many ways" is not only the backdrop for all Museum programming, but it also symbolizes the 40 year journey——and counting—— that The National Great Blacks In Wax Museum has been on.

We are blessed that so many people have ventured with us on this odyssey. As Great Blacks In Wax sets out on the next forty years—and counting—we pause to reflect on and pay homage to our ancestors, recognize their sacrifice, give gratitude to them for their wisdom, and acknowledge their hope for those who follow them.

Know too, that one of these ancestors is Dr. Elmer P. Martin!

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## **About Us**

The National Great Blacks in Wax Museum, founded in 1983 in Baltimore, Maryland, pays tribute to prominent African-American historical figures.

Originally established in a downtown storefront on Saratoga Street, it now occupies 1601 East North Avenue, featuring over 100 wax figures and scenes, including a comprehensive model slave ship exhibit depicting the 400-year history of the Atlantic Slave Trade.

Co-founder Dr. Joanne Martin underscores the importance of preserving Black history to provide context to historical struggles. Baltimore's first wax museum and the nation's inaugural African American history wax museum, it was initiated by Dr. Elmer Martin and Dr. Joanne Martin as a grassroots effort. The museum gained national recognition in 1983, securing grants and loans to establish a permanent exhibition.

In 1988, it settled in a renovated firehouse on the 1600 block of North Avenue, later earning U.S. Congress recognition in 2004 as The National Great Blacks in Wax Museum.

If you would like to see retired Army Gen. Colin L. Powell, the four-star general who became a heroic figure in the eyes of the American public after the Persian Gulf War in 1991, all you have to do is visit the Great Blacks in Wax Museum on East North Avenue.

While it's not the "real" Col. Powell, it's an extraordinary likeness of the nation's first African-American chairman of the Joint Chiefs.

The wax figure was unveiled Tuesday evening at the Great Blacks in Wax Mansion at the corners of E. North Avenue and Broadway Street. The mansion, which is a component of the museum, is located a half-block from the main section of the facility.

Gen. Powell and his wife were in Baltimore for the ceremony only. They toured the museum gries to the unveiling program. He In addition to the Powells, several dignituries attended the unveiling ceremony including U.S. Representative Elijah E. Cummings, and Mayor Kurt L. Schmoke.

"This is an historic occasion because Gen. Powell is an outstanding American and clearly a figure of history," said Mayor Schmoke. "He honors us as much as the Martins have honored him by having his figure in the museum. It's a figure that will inspire our young people to do their best in the future."

He added, "I applaud the Martin's choice, and I'm glad Gen. Powell and his wife were able to attend."

According to Dr. Joanne Martin, the wax figure cost approximately \$8,000 to make. It was commissioned by The Baltimore Times and the Chrysler Corporation. During the ceremony, a representative from Chrysler presented a check for \$25,000 to the Martins to help fund the museum's \$10 million


Dr. Martin said she will always remember the pleased look on Gen. Powell's face.

"I looked directly at him," she said. "He was very moved and touched. I feel great. If I didn't think he felt good about it. I wouldn't feel this way. We're very proud. The reward comes from knowing we did a good job."

Gen. Powell. 56, was born in Harlem to immigrant parents from Jamaica. Despite the rough life of the streets, and an average start in school, he found success in the Army. During his 35-year military career, he became one of the most decorated soldiers to ever serve in the Army.

Gen. Powell's figure joins nearly 200 other wax figures which grace the museum, which include Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Mary Carter Smith, and Rosa Parks.







"I remember flying to Los Angeles for my 2001 appearance on the national game show "To Tell The Truth". As the announcer uttered "And will the real Joanne Martin please stand up!", I scrambled to my feet in acknowledgment that I was the founder of the Great Blacks In Wax Museum and that the other two contestants were imposters and not the real me, all while our Joe Louis wax figure looked out at the lively studio audience."







### Lupita Nyong'o on 12 Years a Slave, Getting Into Character, and 'Impostor's Syndrome'

What sort of research were you doing? How did you get into the character of Patsey and embody her?

"One of the first things I did, I went to the Blacks in Wax Museum in Baltimore. My friend had told me that it was worth it and that you could get a kind of three-dimensional experience of slavery. So I went there and - indeed, I walked into the museum and the first thing I saw was a bale of 500 pounds of cotton, and that's what Patsey was known to pick every day. And it was taller than me and it was thicker than me. And it was way wider than me. I was just, like, met with, "Yeah, this woman was really lofty to do this kind of thing and live so fully in that moment and then at the same time want to die and be relieved of her pain." So that was a real influence, that place. And you see they have extracts from different diaries. These men on the ships and everything, they kept diaries of their experience, so they're talking about how they killed the slaves and put the heads on stakes, and you see in the Middle Passage how everyone was chained together and people would die and everything would fester and all the disease and sickness. So the people who made it to the New World were made of really strong stuff. So that gave me an overview of slavery and other aspects of African-American history that we don't really hear about. Like the fact that one of the first people on the North Pole was a black man. There were lots of Africans that got here that weren't slaves, explorers and stuff. And we never hear about them. I read other accounts of slavery from the female perspective, as well. And the rest is about finding the physicality, the voice, and that kind of thing to make her real."



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
